## Talking about lockdown – worksheet

This worksheet supplements the advice at <u>Talking about lockdown and COVID-19</u>, by Jonathan O'Donnell, at Research Whisperer, 3 November 2020.

## What was the effect?

I've continued to contribute to my discipline by reviewing five journal articles.		

## Data sources

These data sources may help to supplement your own experiences, your own diary and your own memory.

- Your country and city: Many jurisdictions have a timeline on Wikipedia. If not, the <u>Wayback Machine</u> may have archives of the COVID-19 information page for your locale.
- Education: If you happen to know a school principal, they might be able to provide a timeline of school closures faster than trawling though archived announcements from your State department of education. Otherwise search for 'COVID-19 education [your state or country] to find the relevant page and then put that address into the Wayback Machine. This may provide education information provided for your area.
- Your university should be able to provide information on when the university was open or closed, and what restrictions were in place.
- As an applicant, your job isn't to develop a definitive timeline outlining every change made by your local government and your kid's school (although your university's research office might want to). Your job is to provide an overview of the effect of lockdown on your research.
